There were no prizes awarded to anyone from Eastern Canada at the **1970 CLRG World Irish Dancing Championships** (held at Coláiste Mhuire in Parnell Square, Dublin, Ireland on May 1-2-3).

There were nine dancers from North America who competed in Solo championship events, three of whom were from Butler Academy (Laura Masters, Sheila Delaney and Geraldine Whelan) in Toronto.

Five other Butler Academy dancers joined Laura, Sheila and Geraldine to participate in the 8-Hand Ceili championship, making the Butler Academy the school with the largest North American entry at the inaugural event.

# Butler Dancers Represent Canada In Irish Dances

A group of Irish dancers from the Butler Dance Academy are heading for Dublin, Ireland on May 1st., 2nd. and 3rd. to compete in the world's dance championships. This is the first world championship and dancers had to compete and qualify in All Ireland contests. The Butler dancers qualified in New York about a month ago. Some qualifying contests are still being held in Ireland, with one slated for April 24, 25 and 26.

The dancing is divided into different age groups. More entries from schools in Metro Toronto could come in but at press time, these were the only entries.

According to the complete set of results published in CLRG's *Ceim Magazine*, there were no prizes awarded to anyone from Eastern Canada at the **1971 CLRG World Irish Dancing Championships** (held at Coláiste Mhuire in Parnell Square, Dublin, Ireland on April 23-24-25).

There were 51 dancers from North America in attendance, and only two schools from Canada sent dancers – the Butler Academy and the Hayes School.

According to the complete set of results published in *Feiseanna Magazine*, the following *Eastern Canadian* dancers placed at the **1972 CLRG World Irish Dancing Championships** (held at the Mansion House in Dublin, Ireland on April 27-28-29-30):

### **Bord Failte Awards**

These awards were presented to one dancer U15 and one dancer 15&O (male and female combined) with the highest total of points who was not a resident of Ireland or the United Kingdom. This new category of recognition was introduced following two years of disappointment for “overseas” teachers at the World Championships, when only two prizes had been awarded to dancers from across the ocean (one to Donald Golden from the USA in 1970 and one to Lyndall James from Australia in 1971).

This concept evolved and continued for more than two decades as the *Aer Lingus* award (1974-1981) and then the *Overseas Award* for North American, Australian and New Zealand dancers, and was re-introduced in 2015 as the *Aisling Award* exclusively for dancers from newer regions of the world, including: Asia, Mainland Europe & Scandinavia, Russia, South Africa and South America.

Jennifer Mathews was the sole person outside of Ireland and the UK to place in 1972.

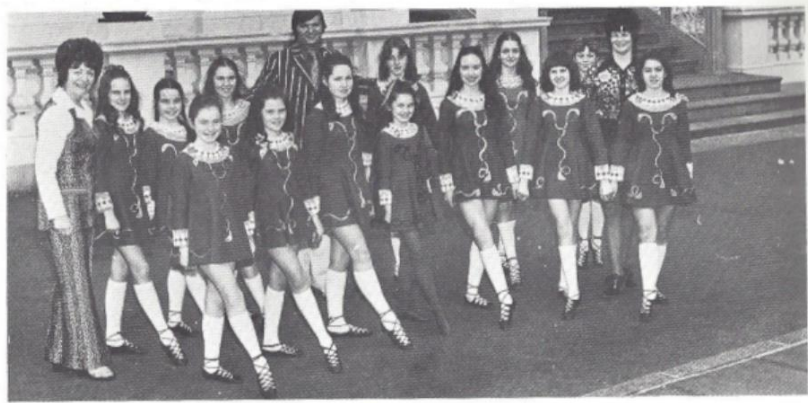

## **Overseas competitors take most awards**

**MORE THAN 1,600** dancers from centres in Australia, North America and the United Kingdom took part in the World Irish Dancing Championships which have been taking place since Thursday last, and ended at the Mansion House in Dublin, yesterday.

Most of the major awards in the individual championships went to overseas competitors and for the first time in the seven years that the event has been held two major awards have gone to American entrants. The panel of adjudicators included representatives from Australia, New Zealand, Canada, the United States, England, Scotland and Ireland.

## **Pickering teen gets her Irish up to win world step-dancing crown**

**PICKERING** — Ruth Garrett, 18, of West Shore Blvd. in Bay Ridges has won the world championship for traditional Irish step-dancing in Dublin.

And, when she flies in from Dublin April 29 with her 13-year-old sister Karen and mother Patricia, her father George Garrett will greet them with a bottle of champagne.

Last year Ruth was runner-up in the competition held in Dublin's famous Mansion House, but this year wrested the title away from the holder, an Irish girl.

She is the first non-Irish resident and the first Canadian to win the step-dancing contest. She competed in the junior ladies' division. Ruth

also holds the Canadian and North American titles.

Her sister Karen, who holds the Canadian and North American titles in the minor girls' category, came 17th out of 110 in Dublin in the juvenile class.

Ruth, a Canadian citizen, was born in Ireland, but came to Canada with her parents when she was 4. Karen was born here.

George Garrett, who received a phone call from his daughter on Easter Monday telling of her victory, said the competition is "big business" over there.

Ruth was one of 98 competitors in her class, including several Canadians. Others came from Britain, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

## He's reeled way to world dance title

MISSISSAUGA — A Mississauga teenager has become a world champion in Irish dancing. Brian Grant, 17, beat 41 other contestants from around the globe in the junior men's category at the recent Irish Dancing World Championships in Dublin.

It hasn't hurt to have his mother as a teacher. Since the age of 3, Brian has taken lessons from his mother, Brigid, at the Grant School of Irish Dancing.

"She doesn't give special preference to me, but I admit I do go down and join her when she's dancing in the basement," Brian says.

Brian's den overflows with trophies in dancing. Last year he won a third place prize at the world championships. He has been in the championships for seven years.

"He might have done even better in the past but it seemed some little thing wasn't right every year — like once he lost his shoe," his father, William Grant, says.

When Brian attends competitions, Grant foots the bill. With both Brian and daughter Colleen dancing, Grant estimates he puts about \$10,000 a year into the dancing.

"I don't mind because we enjoy it and it preserves the Irish culture

in our family," he says. The family also enjoys singing Irish songs.

Although they met in Canada, both Grant and his wife come from County Kilkenny in Ireland.

Brian has spent the past few summers touring North America for shows and competitions, with Grant, a Toronto Transit Commission driver, as chauffeur. And when Brian goes, everybody goes.

"We have a camper and we usually make a real weekend of it; it keeps the kids away from the plazas," Grant says. The kids are Brian, Colleen, 15, and David, 19.

Brian hasn't much time to hang around plazas. He works part-time in a music store, teaches piano, plays the accordion, saxophone and piano, and works furiously on his homework. He's a Grade 11 student at St. Martin's High School and wants to be a doctor.

"Sometimes when I do have spare time, I look around and say 'What do I do now?' — but then I just do some more practising," he says. He practises his Irish reels and jigs more than 10 hours a week, and feels sluggish if he misses as much as two days' practice.

"It's lively dancing — a lot of jumping up and down," he says. "I can jog for miles and not get as tired as I do in 45 minutes' dancing."

## Fast footwork brings prizes to boy

Sara McCloskey of Mississauga taught her three children Irish dancing so they would remember the traditions of the land where she and her husband, Edmund, grew up.

In April her son Michael, then 9, took the lessons he had learned to the World Championships of Irish Dancing in Cork, Ireland, and gave the judges there something to remember.

The Pierre Laporte School student jiggled and hornpiped his way to a second-place finish, beating 46 other boys from Ireland and England and one from the U.S.

"It felt pretty good," Michael says. "It was unexpected," his mother says. "The adjudicators were awed by the fact that a child from North America could do Irish dancing that well. I think maybe they thought he was Irish while he was dancing."

Although Michael isn't Irish, he has the benefit of having a mother who

was raised in Ireland, where she began dancing when she was 7. She won many county open competitions and the Western Ireland Championships twice.

In Canada, she started the McCloskey School of Irish Dance in 1976. It was there that, four years ago, she began giving her son his first lessons in the 500-year-old tradition. She quickly recognized Michael was becoming her best student.

"He's very talented," she says. "He has very quick feet and there doesn't seem to be any distinction between his right and left feet."

The most remarkable thing about Michael's second place finish at the world championships is his age. Although other boys from North America have won in the past, their success usually doesn't come until they are in their late teens. By that age they have had the experience of competing in many championships.

But this year was only Michael's third trip to Cork. Last year he won the prize for the best dancer from "overseas."

Since April Michael has placed first in virtually every North American competition in which he's taken part. His mother says she actually welcomes second-place finishes such as his showing at Cork because she feels they help keep her son on his toes.

Sara McCloskey says she teaches Michael and his sisters, Deirdre, 15, and Fiona, 6, as a means of reminding them of their heritage.

"I wanted them to be aware of the tradition their parents grew up with," she says.

Despite this, she adds, Michael is still a big fan of another, distinctly North American dancer.

"Michael loves Michael Jackson. He always tries to copy him because he's got got such quick feet," she says.

Clare told us she wouldn't have gone to school, anyway, because she brought back a case of flu, but she also bought a lot of souvenirs. "Most of them were for my friends — a chain, a cross, a little statue of a leprechaun and," she added with a giggle, "some shamrock seeds."

The part of the trip she liked best was "going places, like to Castle Clare where a lot of my relatives live — cousins and aunts and uncles. We stayed with them for a week." Clare is a veteran traveller. This was her fourth trip to Ireland and the third time she competed there.

"My first trip the whole family went. (Michael and Anna Casey have two sons and two daughters 9 to 16.) On the second trip I finished 22nd, but last year I didn't get anything, except to get into the finals," she said.

Traditional Irish dancing takes lots of practice, as Clare's father knows. "Her teacher is in Mississauga and I have to drive her over there twice a week, 52 weeks a year," he said. Make that 50 — he had two weeks in Ireland.

## Canadian wins dance contest

THERE were more than 2,000 entries for the World Dancing Championships in Limerick and a Canadian-born student, aged 19, from Ississauga, Ontario, won the Senior Men's World Irish Dancing Championship last evening. He is Brian Grant (19), of the Grant School of Dancing, Ontario, who last year won the Junior Men's title when the world championships were held in Dublin.

In order to win he had had to compete in five dances from reels, jigs, hornpipes and two set pieces. Thirty competed.

# Mississauga man judged best at world Irish jig championship

Brian Grant is dancing a jig for joy these days.

If he wanted to, he could also dance a reel and a hornpipe, because this 20-year-old Mississauga man has been recently judged the top male Irish dancer in the world.

Grant took top honors in the World Championship of Irish Dancing in Limerick, Ireland by beating out 36 dancers who had been judged best in national competitions across North America and the Commonwealth.

"I felt such relief when I won," Grant says. "I had worked so hard for the championships this year and I wasn't that confident because there were so many great dancers."

### Ultimate crown

Grant, who is in his first year of general sciences at the University of Toronto's Erindale College has been exercising hard for the past year, skipping rope and practising for hours, and that has cut into his academic efforts (although he is still maintaining a B+ to A-average).

The young dancer, whose mother, Bridgid, teaches Irish dancing in her Mississauga home and at the Etobicoke Olympium, has won two world championships before, but in younger age categories; the senior mens' title he now holds is considered the ultimate crown.

Irish dancing "involves a lot of footwork," Grant says. "There's no hand motion and the face is relaxed. You look like you're sitting down from the waist up. From the waist down is where you do all the work."

Two pairs of shoes are used in the competition, a soft shoe used when doing a lot of jumping or lifting off the ground and a hard shoe with plastic heels used to create interesting rhythms. The plastic heels are also clicked in mid-air in one of the jumps; very good dancers can click them twice or with back three times in mid-air.

Despite the rigors of training, Irish dancing has not been all hard work for Grant. The 6-foot, 1-inch dancer, who also plays piano and accordion, spent so much time last summer travelling to competitions in Scotland, England, Ireland

Texas and California that he says he "came back with a gut from drinking too many beers."

And when he finishes his exams
